

WORSLEY BUSINESS UPDATE



Half Year Results February 2025

- Aluminium production increased 5%; Copper production increased 16%
- FY25 production guidance remained unchanged, except for Mozal Aluminium where we continued to mitigate the impact of civil unrest in Mozambique
- GEMCO cyclone recovery efforts continued, including the construction of a new wharf and dewatering activities allowing a phased restart of operations
- Illawarra Metallurgical Coal divestment completed

Quarterly Report March 2025

- Net cash increased by US\$299m to US\$252m in the quarter due to strong operating results
- Production highlights include 18% increase in copper and 6% increase in aluminium
- State and Federal government approval for Worsley mine development project
- GEMCO on track to recommence export sales in June 2025 quarter.

CEO Transition announcement May 2025

Matthew Daley to join as Deputy Chief Executive Officer on 2 February 2026; will assume the role of Chief Executive Officer (CEO) when Graham Kerr steps down from the role later in 2026.

Mr Daley will join South32 from Anglo American plc, where he is currently the Technical and Operations Director and a member of the executive leadership team. He joined Anglo American in 2017 as Group Head of Mining, and prior to that he was the Executive General Manager for Glencore's Canadian copper division. Mr Daley's earlier career included operational, commercial and project roles with Xstrata and Minera Alumbrera.

WORSLEY MINE & MATERIALS UPDATE



Safety

- Safety performance remains positive with key metrics all tracking in line with forecasts
- Lead Safely Every Day (LSED) program continues
 - 95% completed Frontline workforce training; 95% LSED Leadership training
- Worsley's Refinery and Mine ERT collaborated with Alcoa to explore a Mutual Aid Agreement relationship and share benchmarking opportunities.
- Road Crash Rescue Training Isolation of Electric Vehicles

Production

- Bauxite quality has improved over the year following early challenges associated with mining remnant ore
- Bauxite inventory remains a challenge as the business navigates the remaining secondary approvals required to facilitate mining in the high-grade areas within the newly approved mining areas.
- Safe execution of two major OBC outages
- New mining activities along the Pinjarra-Williams Road near the mine entrance have commenced.

Mine Enabling Activities

- Water bore exploration –exploration sites close to the Marradong Offices (visible from Pinjarra Williams Road), and near the Boddington Refuse site (potentially visible from Robins Road)
- Materials for construction starting to be delivered to site (eg material at the entrance to Marradong)
- Closure of Siding Road to the public
- Increase in traffic expected on Ashcroft road
- Harvesting of trees south of Gold mine Road (managed by Newmont)

BIODIVERSITY UPDATE



Part of our new approval requires us to survey every area we plan to clear for potential cockatoo hollow usage. This process requires:

- Pre clearance survey to determine trees that would be suitable with minimum DBH requirements
- Then each tree is checked with either a pole camera or drone to get photo evidence and inspect the hollows for their level of usage
- These trees are then ranked on their usage, and any rank 1 or rank 2 trees can be protected with a 30m buffer (unless it is essential for infrastructure, with a limit of 24 trees over the life of our new approval).


































FAUNA MONITORING PROGRAM



Another exciting program that is coming up on site is the annual fauna monitoring program at BBM. This year our surveys will be focused on our saddleback operation. This program is a 10 day trapping program. There is 11 site locations where the trapping will occur, with each trapping site having: pitfall, elliot box traps, wire cage traps, cameras set up and eDNA stations.

During previous fauna programs we have caught: echidna, chuditch, grey bellied dunart, mardo, western pygmy possum, honey possum and genda.

HR Key Activity

- Worsley engagement survey, "Your Voice" completed. 83% participation rate. Results not yet released.

Community Complaints

- 22 complaints FY25, Q3 (15 complaints in Q2)
- 22 complaints related to BBM
 - o 11 complaints related to dust
 - 4 complaints related to noise
 - 2 complaints related excessive blasting notifications
 - 1 complaint related to dust from blasting activities
 - 1 complaint related to impact from blast
 - 2 complaints related to lighting towers
 - 1 complaint related to the environmental management plan for the new Boddington mine there has been impact to birds, mussels and the river. Caller advised they can no longer swim in the river. She has spoken to the council and is asking for a call back. Caller advised she will be contacting ABC news and will be demanding a water quality check. Caller advised it is also impacting local farmers.


OVERALL DEMOGRAPHICS









BODDINGTON-WANDERING-WILLIAMS PARTICIPANTS










of the people in the in Boddington, Wandering, Williams region had lived in the area for more than 10 years or for their whole life.



This region had the second highest percentage of Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander participation.



ASI Performance Standard: 9.1c

- The Entity shall respect, in ways appropriate to its size and circumstances, the legal and customary rights and interests of Affected Populations and Organisations in their lands, livelihoods and use of natural resources, including, as a minimum:

TARIFFS



Of all the South32 commodities, only lead and nickel are subject to the universal/reciprocal tariffs. Copper, alumina, bauxite, aluminium, zinc concentrate, manganese ore, gold, and silver are exempt.

South32's existing commodity books are not exposed to the new tariffs from either pass through or being incurred by South32 (note we do have aluminium sales to the US, tariffs are payable by customer). No immediate action is required to change existing sales books, nor have any placement risks been identified for the short term.

Although there does not appear to be direct impacts from the new tariffs, commodity books believe a net negative impact on commodity prices is to be expected due to the likelihood of a slowdown in global growth and muted demand.

Anticipation of upside risks to freight rates given the introduction of trade flow changes and/or inefficiencies.

Minimal impact to Supply Chain Operations is expected. Stringent documentation requirements for US-bound cargo are already in place and it remains to be seen if more requirements will be imposed



Prices fell for the fourth successive month in March as supply woes across the globe dissipated and as Indonesia ramped up capacity in Q1; prices are now below mid-2024 when a myriad of supply disruptions led to an acute rally.

- Section 40 Authorisation (Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016) for areas outside of the current approved area
